
Children also need to be ready for tests and examinations both at school and in later life. The Bailiwick Big Picture Curriculum helps schools to plan to achieve all of these things.

personal achievement.


The Bailiwick Big Picture

What will it look like in your child's school?

The Big Picture aims to retain the best of current practice in our schools, whilst seeking to place greater emphasis on important elements required to secure well-rounded learning.

There will be a bigger focus on:

- taking learning outside the classroom
- promoting positive mental health and well-being
- understanding the world of work and and the life skills linked to managing money
- the understanding of other cultures and their languages from a younger age (Year 1)

whilst recognising that the skills of communication (including reading, writing and speaking and listening), numeracy and digital empowerment play a central role in all that the children do and will be integral to all aspects of learning.

Communication:

Communication skills offer an essential passport to learning. They involve both sending and receiving information, ideas and opinions. More information and ideas are communicated to us now than ever in a wide variety of forms. Therefore, it is essential to give children and young people the skills to be able to communicate in this constantly changing world.

Numeracy: Maths skills are vital and learners will be offered the chance to develop these skills across all curriculum areas. By exploring these links, children will understand that maths is all around them and will learn how to use maths skills within real life situations.

Digital Empowerment:

All children must be able to use and apply their digital skills, knowledge and understanding confidently and competently in their learning. They will become independent and careful users and creators of technology, able to collaborate, recognise opportunities and risks, and use strategies to stay safe in their global community.

Parental Partnership

Parents and carers are key partners in their children's education and play a vital role in supporting their child's learning, choices and chances in life. We recognise the need for parents and carers to have high quality, easily accessible information about their child's education. One of the best ways to get involved in your child's education is through your child's school.
